The rising cost of living and nationwide veterinary shortages are placing a heavy burden on pet owners in the Rochester area, leaving many families struggling to afford essential care for their beloved companions. Lollypop Farm is dedicated to easing this challenge by offering vital services such as our Pet Food Pantry and SNIP, our low-cost spay and neuter program. We are committed to supporting our community by providing accessible resources to help keep pets in their loving homes.

Community Pet Care Events

Over the summer, Lollypop Farm partnered with local organizations to host Community Pet Care Events, providing essential support for pets and their families. Thanks to the Petco Love Foundation, these events delivered over 1,000 free vaccinations, helping to prevent disease and keep pets healthy. In addition, pet owners received valuable resources, including behavioral support, pet supplies, and more than 5,000 pounds of pet food. By providing essential care these events help build a healthier, more compassionate community for pets and people.

Klingenstein **Veterinary Clinic**

When Jack-Jack was brought to Lollypop Farm, she had a small problem. Well, for her, it was a big problem. Even at only about a quarter of an ounce, the tumor growing on this little dwarf hamster's chest must have seemed enormous to her.

Tiny Jack-Jack needed surgery to remove the tumor so she could move around more easily, and a tissue sample needed to be tested for cancer. Dr. Ann Marie McNamara of the Lollypop Farm Klingenstein Veterinary Clinic performed the intricate surgery.

Jack-Jack's small size made her a high-risk patient, but she proved to be resilient. Her procedure went very well and the tumor was sent off for testing. Luckily, the biopsy results showed the tumor was non-cancerous, which was the best outcome for little Jack-Jack.

Every pet deserves a second chance, no matter how small. Now, Jack-Jack has found a loving home with her foster family, thanks to donors like you who support pets of every size.

This summer, they helped teach Lollypop Farm Campers all about goats. Joy and Riley joined classroom sessions, giving campers the opportunity to pet and interact with them. This hands-on experience provided a unique opportunity for young animal lovers to learn about caring for animals responsibly.

Joy and Riley show just how powerful hands-on learning can be in building a more caring community. As beloved members of the farm team, they'll keep inspiring visitors for years to come.





Patches and Tootsie

Equine

Patches, a 19-year-old Appaloosa mare, and Tootsie, an 18-year-old Grey Arabian mare, were brought to Lollypop Farm after their elderly owner could no longer care for them. Little did we know that these two very sweet and well-mannered horses had a special relationship.

When they arrived, Lollypop Farm equine staff suspected that Patches was blind. A large animal veterinarian confirmed this during a physical examination. It quickly became clear that Patches and Tootsie's bond was truly something special. They had spent years together, and Patches had come to rely on Tootsie to navigate the world around her.

Unfortunately, Patches condition started to deteriorate, and our equine team noticed her eyes were becoming swollen and irritated. To give her the best quality of life, veterinarians recommended surgery to remove them. But one concern remained—what would Patches do without Tootsie by her side? Understanding the importance of their connection, Lollypop Farm staff made sure Tootsie traveled with her friend to Genesee Valley Equine Clinic for the procedure.

Thanks to Lollypop Farm's generous community of supporters, Patches received the best possible care, and her surgery went smoothly. Today, she and Tootsie are thriving in a loving foster home through the C.A.R.E. program (Compassionate Aid for Retired Equine). Patches still follows the sound of Tootsie's steps, a testament to their enduring friendship. Their story is a beautiful reminder of the power of ensuring that every animal receives the care and compassion they deserve.

Humane Law Enforcement

In April 2024, an unprecedented rescue effort changed the lives of more than 160 dogs in need. Lollypop Farm's Humane Law Enforcement team, alongside our Animal Emergency Response Team, executed a warrant at a home in Rochester for what was thought to be 60 dogs.



What they discovered was far worse. The conditions inside the home were so unsanitary that the team had to wear hazmat suits and respirators to safely enter. Over the course of a single day, 120 dogs were rescued and brought to Lollypop Farm, where they


received the urgent care and veterinary attention they desperately needed. Several dogs were found to be pregnant, bringing the total number of dogs to 163.

By May, all but two of the dogs had been surrendered to Lollypop Farm, beginning their journey toward adoption. Our Behavior team worked tirelessly to socialize these dogs, many of whom were extremely fearful of human interaction. They also conducted numerous home visits to adopters, ensuring a smoother transition for these frightened friends.

To reduce stress and provide a safe, comfortable environment, our Foster Team secured temporary housing for many of the dogs.

Remarkably, this case inspired over 300 new foster volunteers to step forward and help!

Meanwhile, staff and volunteers tackled the monumental tasks of cleaning, laundry, and the increased workload of caring for so many dogs. Thanks to the dedication of our team, the generosity of our community, and the support of countless donors, these dogs were given a second chance at a better life.



When little Elvis arrived at Lollypop Farm, he was in rough shape and desperately needed medical care. Severe infections had damaged both of his eyes beyond saving, and they had to be removed to relieve his pain. At only 3/4 of a pound, he was too young and too little for that kind of operation, but the pain was so unbearable that Elvis injured his eye further, and surgery became an immediate need.

While he was in surgery, the family that brought him in found another kitten—his sibling, Priscilla. Just like her brother, Priscilla had a badly infected eye which also needed to be removed. Both kittens made it through surgery like little champs and started their recovery in the loving home of Lollypop Farm Foster Care Supervisor, Sue.




team, campers tour the facility, meet veterinary

Capital Campaign

Thanks to the unwavering generosity of our donors, the Kindness for All Kind Capital Campaign has made incredible progress since its launch in 2021. This long-term initiative is transforming our campus to better serve the animals and people who rely on Lollypop Farm.

In 2024, we surpassed \$25 million in contributions, a major milestone reflecting both the urgent need for our services and the commitment of our philanthropic community to animal welfare. While we celebrate this success, much work remains. To achieve our vision and meet growing demand, your continued support is essential, and we need even more people to join us in this effort.

Construction is now underway, focusing on key areas that will enhance our ability to care for animals and serve our community.

- New Animal Intake Center: By functionally separating dogs and cats, we aim to reduce anxiety and provide a more peaceful experience. The center will also include private counseling rooms to offer support for individuals making the difficult decision to surrender a pet.
- Enhanced Dog Holding Facility: This new facility will help reduce anxiety and improve recovery times for dogs, particularly those who have experienced trauma or neglect. It will also enhance our ability to properly separate animals based on health, behavior, or quarantine needs, ensuring better overall care.
- Community Hub: Our new Welcome Center and the Karpus Family Foundation Learning Center will feature community spaces, exhibits, and classrooms where people of all ages can learn about animal welfare, empathy, and responsible pet ownership.

- Expanded Farm Facilities: The new East Campus will provide ten additional pastures and a Farm Intake Center, designed to ensure animal safety with dedicated isolation spaces.
- Streamlined Operations: A Donations and Support Center will provide much-needed facilities to receive and warehouse supplies and donations needed to meet the shelter's growing needs.

As we move forward, additional upgrades and renovations are planned and will proceed as funding allows. As we continue our journey, we remain inspired by your faith in the power of kindness to shape a better future.







